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Headteacher Introduction



Welcome to the Summer 2024 edition of Eckington's newsletter. As we approach the end of a very busy academic year, I hope this newsletter provides parents, carers, and friends of Eckington School an indication of the amazing achievements that have taken place.

Recently, our Year 11 and Year 13 students have completed their GCSE and A-Level examinations. I am looking forward to greeting all of our year 11 and year 13 students on their results day in August.



I am pleased to inform you that in July 2024, we conducted an independent review of our new anti-bullying processes that were launched in January 2024. The feedback was very positive, including positive student feedback, highlighting many improvements. Our new anti-bullying threshold system has been designed to help tackle all forms of unkind behaviour and is aimed at preventing repeated episodes of unkind behaviour (bullying).

The launch of The Eckington Way and our new behaviour systems were also acknowledged during the external antibullying audit, with students stating that these new initiatives have had a positive impact on the school's culture and climate for learning.

I hope the contents of this newsletter also provides you with some highlights of the "Eckington Enrichment" opportunities our students have had outside of the classroom (our Eckington Enrichment programme can be found on the school's new website). There have been some amazing opportunities this term, including the relaunch of the Duke of Edinburgh Award, where a group of Year 11 and Year 12 students completed their weekend expedition to the Peak District National Park. All students took part in a whole-school sports day on 10th July that was designed by the PE department to be 100% inclusive (where all students had the opportunity to partake in a sporting activity). There was also a successful residential trip to Barcelona, where 50 students enjoyed experiencing a different culture whilst competing in football, netball and basketball. I would like to take this opportunity to thank all staff who volunteer to run these enrichment opportunities outside of their contacted working hours (during lunchtimes, after school clubs and weekends). It is great to see so many students taking up these amazing opportunities and thriving in them!

Eckington School's motto of "outstanding achievement for all" has also been celebrated in many ways this term. Some members of the staff body have completed marathons, one member of staff has represented England at fell running! Another amazing achievement is our U16 boys football team winning the Derbyshire Cup!

Since April, the decision was made to only use Eckington's official Facebook and Instagram pages for regular updates; this will continue into next year so please subscribe and follow us.

Over the summer holiday, all classrooms are having new, state-of-the-art interactive TV screens installed. Other areas of the school are being decorated and new water fountains are being installed (following a request from student voice). I am pleased to inform you that future plans to refurb our student toilets and other classrooms are also being considered.




Exam Preparation






Rotary Club - Young Photographer Competition

Duke of Edinburgh's Award

This year Eckington School has relaunched the Duke of Edinburgh Award.

During the weekend of 28 - 29 June, students had a couple of training days in school to learn first aid, tent skills, cooking, survival and map skills. They even learned how to pack their huge bag correctly. They then had a practice walk around the Eckington area with all their kit to practise their new navigational map and compass skills.

On the weekend of 6 - 7 July we took 12 Year 10 and six Year 12 students on their two day, one night qualifying expedition. We covered 30km + and over 50,000 steps across the Hope Valley, carrying all of their equipment (and food!) and camped overnight in the Peak District. The students weren't allowed their phones or Google maps and had to find their way using team work and problem solving.

All of the students were incredible and showed fantastic resilience, particularly given the amount of rain we had.

Mr Shore wants to congratulate them all for completing and passing this challenging experience.

We hope to grow the Duke of Edinburgh next year offering the Bronze to Year 10 and Year 12 again next year, with the possibility to growing to the Gold Award the year after to Year 12.

Year 10 Geography field trip



As part of the Geography GCSE course we conduct two fieldwork trips. We took over 100 Year 10 geography students to see an urban regeneration project in Sheffield. Park Hill Flats is an area that has seen many changes over the last 100 years, from being a dirty and dangerous place to being one of the most desired locations in the country. Our students were all pleasantly surprised to see how successful the most recent change, or urban regeneration, was. We even had a few enquiring how much it would cost to buy one of the newly refurbished flats.

We conducted our fieldwork and collected primary data to help answer our fieldwork investigation title. The students can be seen here near the newly regenerated section which is now home to smart new apartments, offices, cafes, and shops.



Following our trip, we took the students to a lecture theatre in Sheffield Hallam University so we could continue our write-up of the investigation. We are incredibly grateful to our close friends at Sheffield Hallam University for the use of their facilities. Our students were in awe of the amazing facilities they have to offer and the experience of student life.

The second of our geography trips will be examining the course of the River Porter in Sheffield. We look forward to seeing geography in real life and getting our feet wet.
